Executive Summary

The Local Government Insurance Trust (LGIT), a member owned risk and insurance pool for Maryland local governments, was founded in 1987 for the public sector by the Maryland Association of Counties (MACo) and the Maryland Municipal League (MML). Currently, LGIT has 194 participants.

When established, LGIT responded to a situation of diminished availability and escalating costs for commercial insurance. Since its inception, the Trust has provided coverage at competitive rates to benefit local governments, and ultimately the taxpayers of the State of Maryland.

Primary Goals of the Trust

- Achieve insurance coverage for counties, municipalities, and related public agencies in Maryland
- Provide member services in-house and obtain volunteer services when advantageous
- Review, analyze, and improve member service
- Develop rate, risk management, and cost containment strategies to maintain the financial integrity of LGIT



MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



In my note for our annual Financial Statements, I said that FY23 was remarkable in several respects. Let's face it, we didn't make great headlines or grab the attention of the *Baltimore Sun*. Yet, we did the hard work that made a difference where it mattered, and the good results are a testament to everyone at this 36th Annual Meeting, and all those working in local government across Maryland.

Foremost, the Trust in FY23 retained all its members from the previous year. Baltimore Metropolitan Council, City of Fruitland, and Town of Templeville joined during the year. The total members reached 194; we served 17 counties, 149 municipalities, 25 sponsored entities, the Maryland Municipal League, the Maryland Association of Counties, and the Local Government Insurance Trust itself.

FY23 financial results were about what we expected, which is remarkable given all the turmoil that took place in the world. The total premiums paid to LGIT were about \$2 million higher than the year before, which was an increase of about 9%. Credits and payments for protection against large losses were about \$12 million, or about 4% higher. The projected cost of open claims at year end was higher by about \$2 million, going from \$23.2 million to just at \$25 million. Even though the net surplus was down about 5%, this was mainly attributable to our commitment to premium credits. These credits were mostly offset by investment income; \$9.5 million more in FY23 2023 than in FY22. For every dollar we gave back to you in credits, we made back 65 cents in earnings on roughly \$60 million invested. So, the bottom line remained healthy, with net assets of almost \$48 million. This position was again well within the target range that makes us actuarially sound and still one of the best performing entities among other state-wide risk management programs serving local governments across the United States.

More important information about FY23 can be found in the audited Financial Statements contained in our Annual Certified Financial Report that will be available on our website. Also included in that report are the Transmittal letter and Management's Discussion and Analysis, which provide detail regarding the financial operations of the Trust. The annual audit went very well largely due to the quality and the stability of the staff in our Finance Department, along with the guidance from our Finance and Audit Committee. Speaking of committees, we should remember that these were an ongoing feature of LGIT's engagement that helped us throughout the year. Many of you helped in key parts of the operations and decisions about claim reserves, settlements, coverage improvements, loss control grants, training, investment practices, and the special awards that we are making at this time.

As my term as Chair of the Board of Trustees come to an end after five years, please know how much your confidence and support has meant to all the Trustees. You allowed us to represent you and the entire membership in our interactions across Maryland and beyond. We should also be thankful for our highly experienced staff. Together, the commitment of LGIT's members, staff and all the supporting stakeholders was beneficial in countless ways. That commitment is what kept us in the top tier among our peer organizations and delivered on LGIT's promise of excellence to Maryland's citizens.

The LGIT health administrator, benefit program consultant, claims auditor, and claims adjusting firms across the state also made important contributions. The facilities in Hanover continued to serve their function without any unexpected costs, offering a means for conducting business that was both visible and reasonably accessible to all members.

The development of people was essential to the goal of high performance in our 36th year. Nurturing the confidence and can-do spirit of every individual was important. High engagement at spring renewal workshops, participation in Mayor’s Day, MACo and MML conferences, and the quiet launch of a “learning organization” initiative help strengthen the LGIT community.

All these things were vital elements that made LGIT stand out in FY23, and their continuation is the foundation for future excellence.

The Cannabis Conundrum: What Legalization Means

SESSION OVERVIEW

On July 1, 2023, the new Maryland state cannabis law went into effect, changing the law on the purchase, possession, and usage of cannabis. Our panel will help navigate the challenges legal cannabis presents for Maryland's local governments. Topics discussed will include the zoning issues and the impact of growing and dispensary operations could have on our local communities. Also discussed will be the changing landscape for local government employers and potential concerns and considerations with Human Resources and employee policy development.

SPEAKERS

Elissa Levan is a municipal lawyer with nearly three decades of experience representing cities and towns throughout central and northern Maryland. In addition, she regularly represents other jurisdictions with respect to individual matters in various areas such as contracts, land use, public sector personnel law and public ethics. She serves on the Board of the Maryland Municipal League.

Kevin Karpinski is the managing partner in the law firm of Karpinski, Cornbrooks & Karp. He concentrates his practice in defending civil rights claims, including claims of employment discrimination, use of excessive force by police officers and other claims filed against public entities and their officials.

In addition to defending claims, he regularly advises County and Municipal human relations officials through the LGIT employment hotline, has reviewed numerous personnel manuals and counseled clients regarding compliance with the State's open meeting laws and disclosure of documents under the Freedom of Information Act. Mr. Karpinski also has served as counsel to the Montgomery County Board of Elections since 2003. In that capacity, Mr. Karpinski has been involved in several cases involving the judicial review of charter and local law petitions processed by the Montgomery County Board of Elections.

JOHN CARLI

Mayor, Former Chief of Police,
Vacaville, CA



Police Chief **John Carli** (Ret.) has 32 years of experience and is recognized as a progressive and innovative leader in law enforcement, promoting best practices in policing. In the summer of 2016, Carli was summoned to the White House to meet with President Obama in the wake of national high-profile police encounters.

As police chief for seven years before his retirement in 2021, John directed a department during times of crises such as wildfires, protests, and the pandemic. Understanding the need for public trust and police legitimacy, Carli is an outspoken advocate for the law enforcement profession. Carli's most relevant work focuses on national best practices in policing, crisis communication, risk management, and media engagement.

Carli is a thought leader and pioneer regarding employee wellness. Recognizing the gap between first responders in crisis and the need for early prevention strategies, John's preventive approach to promoting this culture led to the development of the Cordico Wellness App. His contribution to first responder wellness is recognized internationally.

Carli is an Executive Fellow with the National Policing Institute, focusing on the continuous improvement within the policing profession. John holds a Master of Science Degree in Strategic Leadership and is a graduate of the Police Executive Research Forum's Senior Management Institute for Police. Carli is an outspoken advocate for the law enforcement profession and his most relevant work focuses on national best practices in policing including crisis communication, risk management, and media engagement.

John Carli was elected to the Vacaville City Council in 2022, to fulfill a four-year term as Mayor where he continues his public service for the City of Vacaville. John holds a Master of Science Degree in Strategic Leadership and is a graduate of the Police Executive Research Forum's Senior Management Institute for Police. Carli is an Executive Fellow with the National Policing Institute, focusing on the continuous improvement within the policing profession.





Open Meetings Act

SESSION OVERVIEW

This class provides an overview of Maryland's Open Meetings Act law, which guides public officials in the requirements for providing public notice of the meetings that public bodies hold to conduct public business and for closing meetings when appropriate. The presenters focus on steps that local governments can take to comply with the law's application to Maryland local government, discuss some of the cases and complaints that have come before the Open Meetings Compliance Board, and, if time permits, address questions from the audience.

SESSION INSTRUCTORS

April Ishak

City Attorney, Havre de Grace

A graduate of Rutgers University, April Ishak began her legal career more than 25 years ago representing parties in class and derivative stockholder litigation in the Delaware Court of Chancery. She shifted her practice to Maryland in 2009. Her interest in municipal law developed while working at a Bel Air law firm that represented municipalities in Harford County. In 2017, April was appointed City Attorney for Havre de Grace. She opened her solo practice in June 2019. The remainder of her legal practice is dedicated to estate planning, estate administration, business law, and civil litigation.

In 2015, Governor Hogan appointed April to serve on the three-member Open Meetings Compliance Board. She was re-appointed in 2020 to Chair the Board. She is also a member of the Maryland Municipal Attorneys Association and serves as General Counsel to the MFRW. In 2020, April began teaching Open Meetings Act classes. April enjoys spending spare time with her family and boating on the Chesapeake Bay.

Frank Johnson

Assistant City Attorney, Gaithersburg

Frank has served local government since 2000 at both the county and municipal level. He was elected to the Mt. Airy Town Council in 2000, when he was also an Assistant County Attorney for Montgomery County. He later served as Special Assistant and then Senior Assistant County Attorney for Carroll County, handling legislative affairs, and was elected Mayor of Mt. Airy in 2006. He later handled federal Circuit Court appeals for several years with the U.S. DOJ, but returned to local government in 2014 as Deputy City Attorney for Gaithersburg. In 2016 he wrote the Municipal Infractions manual, published by MML, and is currently completing an LL.M. degree in conflict resolution and management. He has been teaching Open Meetings classes since 2017.

The LGIT Life Saver Award is presented to an employee of a LGIT member who has been directly responsible for saving a human life beyond their normal duties. There are two members with honorees this year from Calvert County and Queen Anne's County.

Keith Gross, Terrence King, Alex Thompson

Calvert County

On November 2, 2022, a serious multi-vehicle accident occurred at the intersection of Rt. 4 and Sweetwater Road in Lusby. Staff from Calvert County Solid Waste and Water and Sewer were nearby and quickly responded to the accident. Solid Waste staff Alex Thompson and Terrence King utilized fire extinguishers from their county vehicle to extinguish the fire on one vehicle and assisted in extracting the driver from both vehicles. Water and Sewer staff Keith Gross, assisted in extracting the driver of the second vehicle. Both drivers were flown to shock trauma and survived due to the on scene efforts of Keith, Terrence and Alex.

Justin Harris, Corey Lancaster, Jeffrey Hallett

Queen Anne's County

On March 15, 2023, a Parks Department maintenance crew consisting of four employees drove to a county park to perform routine maintenance of the facility. After arriving at the location, and exiting the vehicle, without warning one of the employees fell to the ground. Observing their co-worker collapsing, Justin Harris, Jeffrey Hallett and Corey Lancaster quick came to the aid of their stricken fellow employee to render aid. They quickly realized the victim was suffering from a seizure and was in respiratory distress. Corey Lancaster immediately called 911 while Harris and Hallett began attempting to assist there co-worker. The situation quick deteriorated with the employee going into full cardiac arrest. Harris immediately began CPR, Hallett stayed on the phone with the 911 dispatcher and Lancaster ran to the park entrance to direct the EMS team to their location. Arriving EMS provided continual resuscitation measures for approximately one hour before the victim arrived at the University of Maryland Shock Trauma. The quick actions of Justin, Jeffrey, and Corey to immediately summons help, render aid and perform CPR played a key role in the successful outcome of this incident. The stricken employee was able to return to work 3 months after the incident. Without their quick and decisive actions, the outcome could have been very different.
